many of our visitors have done the train journey from Colombo to Kandy.

One of the mammals common to HPH is the Pangolin. It has very seldom, if ever, been seen by visitors to our Homestay because of its nocturnal habits, though its "calling card" – termite hills ripped apart by its massive claws - is often in evidence, particularly after rainy weather. The animal's English name is derived from the Malaysian, meaning "one that can make itself into a ball," reflecting its

ability to do exactly that when threatened. Its primary diet is of insects which it gathers after ripping apart anything that looks like an ant abode with the afore-mentioned claws. It then proceeds to take out the ants and their grubs with its long sticky tongue which can be up to a foot long!. Thanks to the predilection of many in East Asia for "mumbo-jumbo" medicine, this remarkable animal is on the IUCN's endangered list and readers of this newsletter are encouraged to join one of the organizations dedicated to saving this (and other endangered species) from extinction.


